# I WOULD NOT LIKE TO Say What Exactly Caused Death

## New Head of Camp School

A Glossop man 31-year-old Mr. Kenneth Oldham has been appointed first full time head-master of Whitehough Camp School, Barley. At present an assistant master at West End Secondary Modern School, Glossop, Mr. Oldham is a Fellow of the Royal Entomological Society and has had considerable experience in camping and other outdoor activities. The post carries salary ranging from £600 to £875 per year, plus various emoluments, and Mr. Oldham is likely to take up his new post on May 1st.

## Says Doctor at Inquest

A DOCTOR told a Nelson inquest on Saturday: "I would not like to say the exact cause of death."

He was referring to the death of 44-year-old Elizabeth Macmillan, of 13 Bold Street, Colne, who was found dead in bed by her aunt yesterday week.

The Coroner asked Dr. H. H. Buller, of Colne: "Can you give us any idea how long you think she had been dead?"

The Doctor replied: "Perhaps four to six hours." He then added that he had attended the woman for a month but not for anything which was likely to cause death. "I would not like to say the exact cause of death," he concluded.

The inquest was adjourned until Friday, March 18th.

Bob Warburton likewise agreed on the general idea of playing Sunday cricket at Seedhill, but felt that "we must go in for it properly;" we must go in, as he put it, "for a competitive sort of cricket which is worth watching, or else don't bother."

Mr. Powis explained the Lancashire League attitude. The League had lifted the ban on Sunday cricket being played on grounds within its ambit, but only Sunday cricket of a non-competitive nature. Further than that, many of the clubs which had voted in favour of lifting the ban had since declared that they, themselves, whilst not wishing to dictate to other clubs, would not permit Sunday cricket on their own grounds. This was something of a paradox.
